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
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Structural Funds: Is it a new hope?

- Huge funding for countries accessing EU in 2004
- Part of it is accessible also for CSOs
- High expectations then "Illusion of inclusion"
- Many problems in implementation of ESF/ERDF projects

What experience do have CSOs?

- Co-financing
- Cash-flow (loans, mortgages, delayed payments, etc.)
- Downturn during economic crisis less donors

- Multi-source funding
- Voluntary work


What happened in CSOs?

Our research is based on data of 272 Czech CSOs

- Application of Difference in difference methods with matching on:
 - Revenues
 - Personnel costs
 - Profit
- Data from CEDR III, Monit7+, Albertina.
 Comparison of SF CSOs-beneficiaries with other CSOs


CSOs revenues in the CR (means)

blue: supported; red: not-supported



CSOs revenues in the CR (median)

blue: supported; red: not-supported



Conclusions

What does it mean?

 Some CSOs main income depends on the Structural Funds

How to continue?

- To find data for other CSOs (more cases)
- There are outliers to analyse them (and apply the test without them)
